Introduction

Protecting our Planet and taking action against climate change is extremely important to pupils/ students at The GLC. They recognise that it is up to them to 'Be the Change'. With that in mind they have worked together to build upon the social action work they did during the last academic year. This work received recognition at the Ormiston #WeWill awards ceremony in July 2023.

Our Eco Warrior team across the GLC worked together to identify their objectives for 2024-2025:

- Be positive role models for peers, family, teachers and our community
- Promote the importance of looking after our planet
- Develop an eco pledge
- Encourage peers, family, teachers and our community to make changes
- Identify and lead change projects to achieve the Eco Schools Award

This was used to shape the actions they would take throughout the year, with key activities identified below:

- Eco Pledge
- Eco Family Fest
- Eco Schools award



Eco Pledges

All GLC primary academies now have an Eco Pledge which was developed by the pupil/student leaders with their peers. In line with the GLC motto, they are all different, all equal and reflect the unique characteristics of each academy.

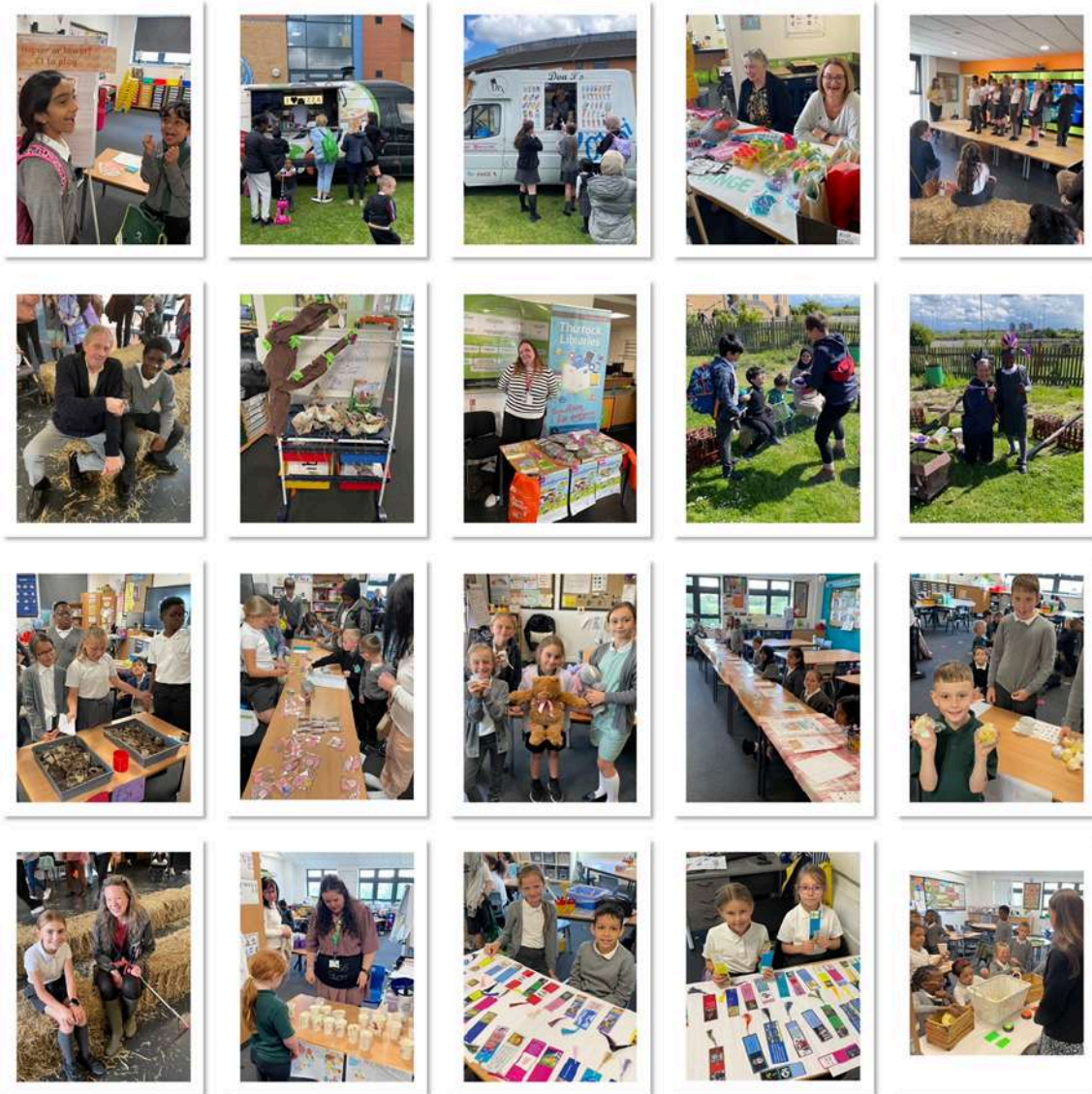


Eco Family Fests

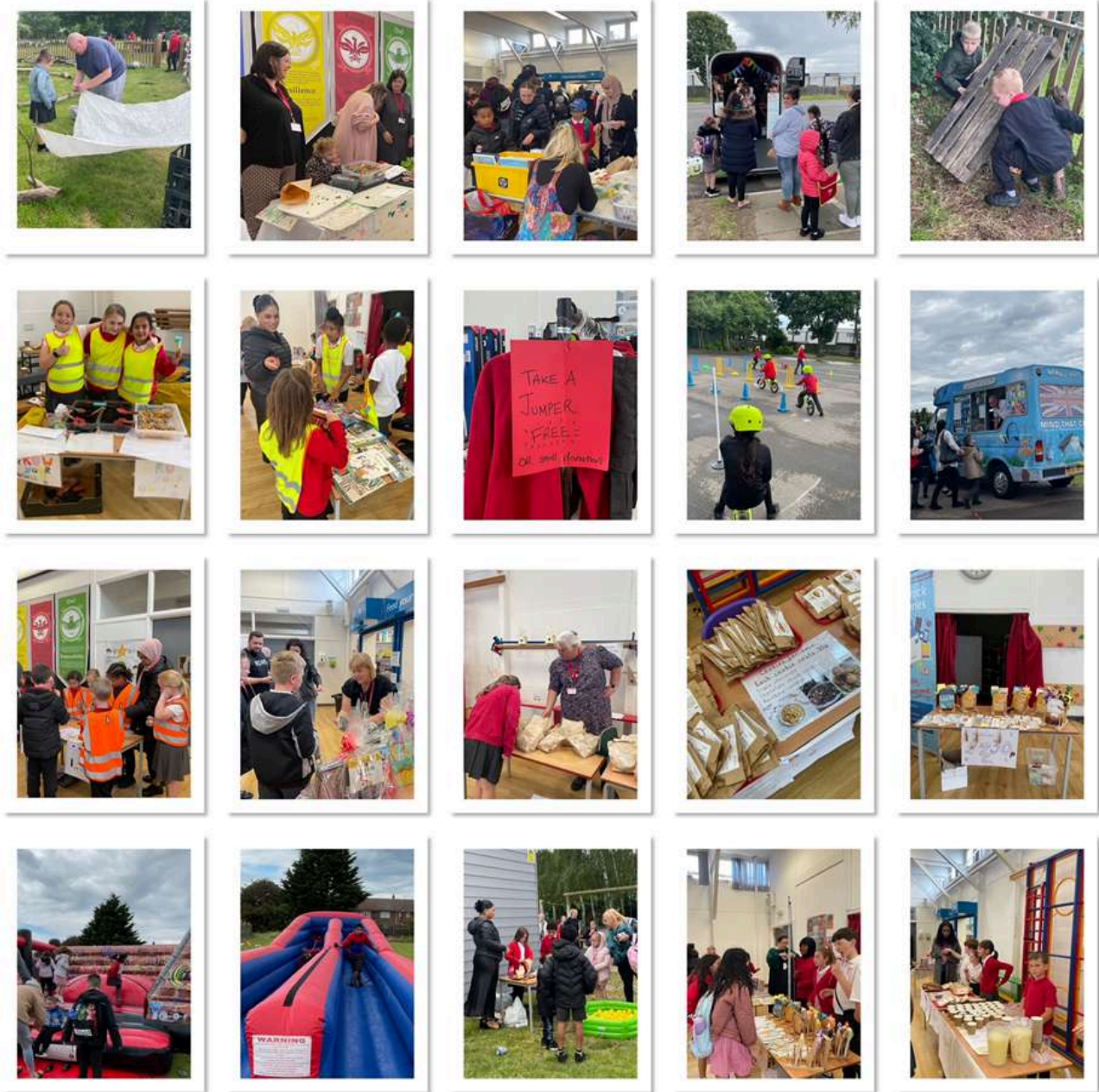
Eco leaders liaised with Maths leads to incorporate 'My Money Week' and with English leads to include activities to develop pleasure for reading. Previously the activities planned for 'My Money Week' used a lot of non recyclable materials such as plastic to make items or as containers for food and drinks. This year the 'rules' the Eco Leaders created meant that children were much more creative than previous years. For instance, selling items on all the stalls was replaced with some stalls having a fruit machine game [with children as the machine] or penalty shoot outs. Children and staff noticed that activities like this looked after health and wellbeing as well as being amongst the highest earners.

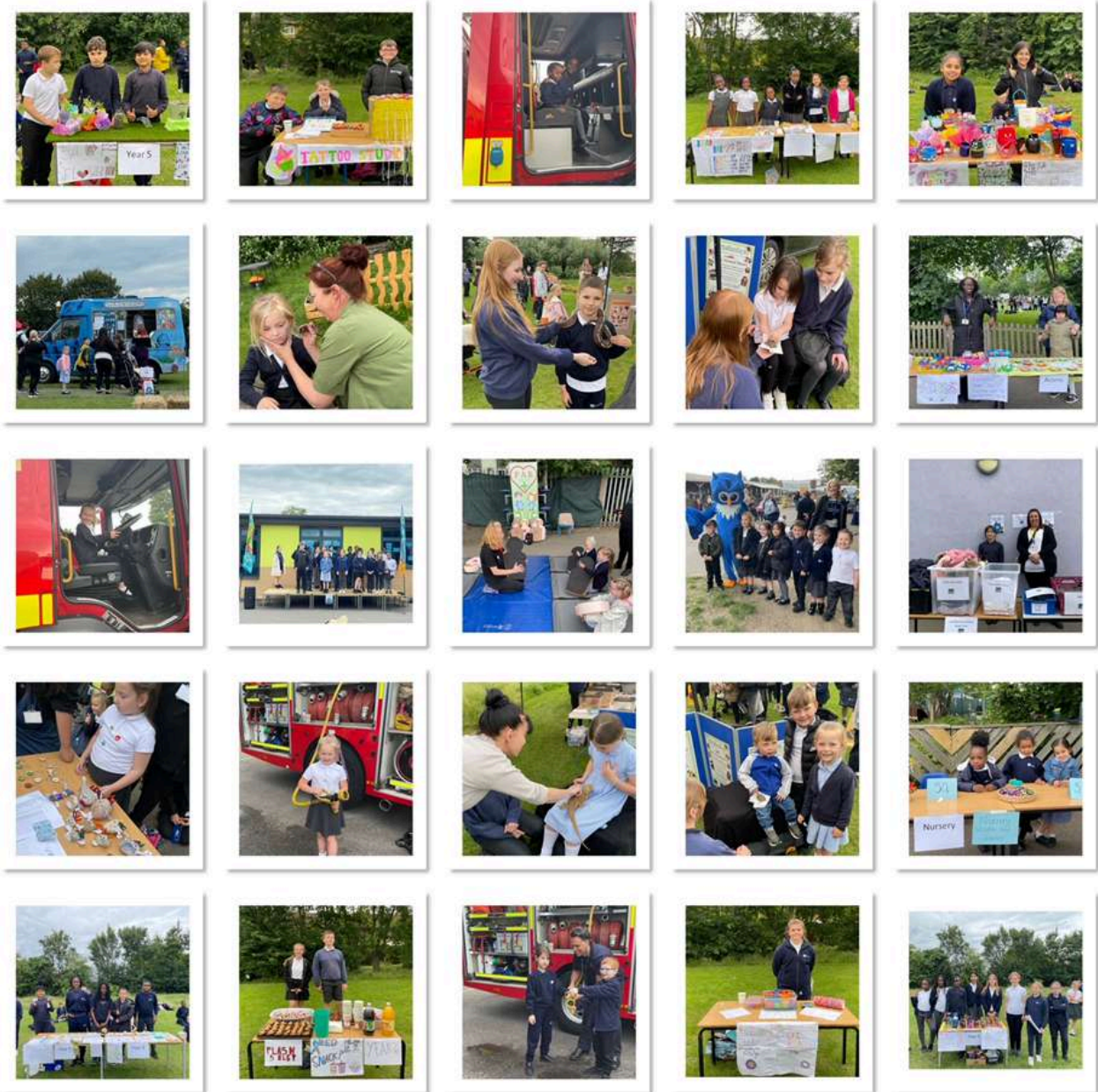

English leads worked with pupil librarians to create a 'Book Swap' stall and Eco leaders persuaded Miss Bevan to tell stories with a didgeridoo around a campfire.



Author Visit at the Gateway Academy

At the Gateway Academy, the award-winning Essex author Ray Star attended during 'Go Green week' to complete a creative writing workshop with 150 Key Stage 3 and Year 9 students. The workshop centred around her book 'Earthlings'. Ray's 'Earthlings' trilogy focuses on the extent to which our consumption of livestock causes mass destruction to the animal population. Throughout the presentation part of the workshop students were presented with the hard-hitting facts and figures relating to the lifespan of the most popular livestock within the UK; along with an endearing story of what happens to chicks that are raised in primary schools during the Easter term as part of the popular 'watch them hatch' scheme. By sharing her own lived experiences and thought processes, Ray empowered all of our students to be able to come up with an original idea for their own piece of creative writing that was based on something that they felt passionate about. Students flourished throughout the workshop each being able to plan a thought provoking purpose, protagonist, setting and antagonist for their own story.



Eco Family Fest Outcomes and Benefits

- The Eco Fests, despite some of the worse weather conditions we have ever seen in June, were a huge success. Eco leaders spoke about how the whole community came together-pupils, staff, parents and local community members. They described how all teams [including those who don't usually get involved] and all classes used their communication and critical thinking skills to plan and adapt [due to the weather] a large-scale event. Key benefits were captured by key stakeholders.
- The book swap was a highlight at Gateway Primary Free School and is now a half termly feature. Following the author visit, many students have said that they felt privileged to have the opportunity to meet a published author. Pupils said;

"I have never had the confidence to write my own story but now feel I have the skills to start that journey." - Year 8 pupils

"It would've been nice if we could have had the visit before the assessment so that they could use the skills in their creative writing term three assessment." - Year 7 pupils

Further develop links with 'eco-friendly' services in the local area and further afield

greater community involvement

Plan a week where there is less happening (no tests / trips or visits)

Ensure that all individuals involved have clarity around their role/responsibility.

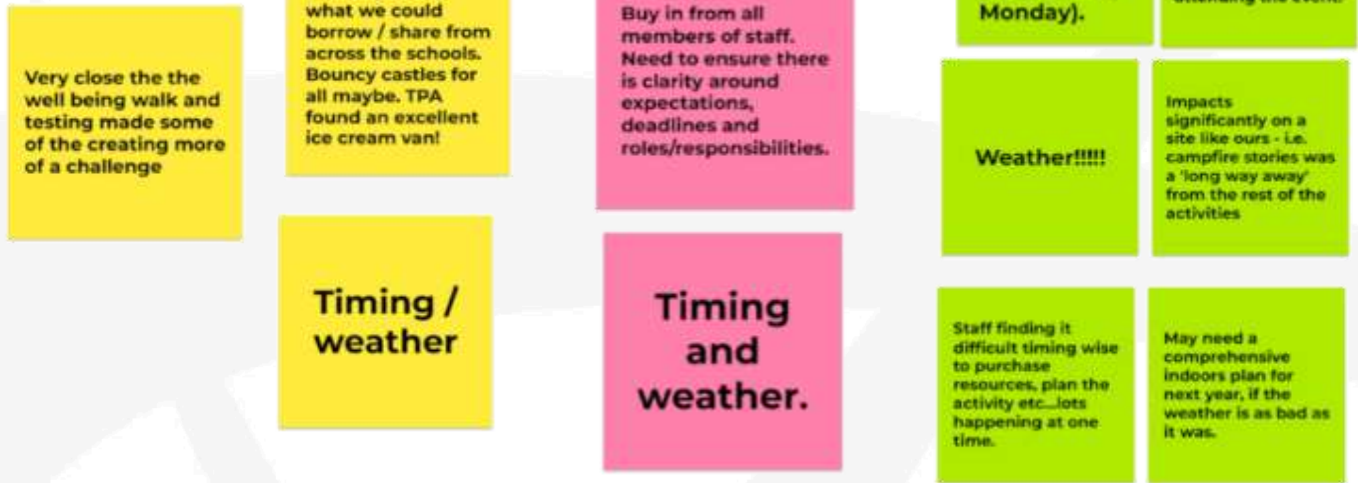
Do we invite members of the community and advertise with local residents as well as our families?? Can we use estate agents/for sale signs advertising in front gardens.
